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



MOUNT SAINT VINCENT UNIVERSITY M.ED. (CURRICULUM STUDIES, EAL FOCUS) TEACHER COHORT

Mount Saint Vincent University M.Ed. (Curriculum Studies, EAL Focus) teacher cohort is set to begin in July, 2013. The Department of Education & Early Childhood Development's Student Services Division has been working collaboratively with Mount Saint Vincent University and school boards to provide an opportunity for grade primary to 12 teachers in the CBVRSB, SRSB, and CCRSB to participate in a M.Ed. (EAL) teacher cohort to enhance their knowledge and skills in teaching students who have English as an additional language. Applicants must have a B.Ed. plus at least one year of teaching experience as a pre-requisite. The program is designed for teachers who are currently teaching full time.

This M.Ed. program has been approved by the Minister's Advisory Committee for Teacher Certification, and individual teachers can submit an application to the Office of Teacher Certification for approval.


Cyberbullying Hurts: Respect for Rights in the Digital Age Standing Senate Committee on Human Rights

Senate committees conduct in-depth studies on topics related to their mandates. On November 30, 2011, the Standing Senate Committee on Human Rights was given the mandate to examine the growing issues of cyberbullying and its impact on young Canadians. The mandate was examined and reported on under Article 19 of the United Nations' Convention on the Rights of the Child.

In essence, this article requires all countries who have signed the convention to protect children under 18 from all forms of physical and mental violence. It is of interest to note that all UN member states, with the exception of the United States and Somalia, have approved the convention.

Of particular note is the study examined cyberbullying as a violation of the human rights of children under the UN Convention. Senator Patrick Brazeau, deputy chair of the committee stated "When a child has been bullied, or cyberbullied, his or her right to be free from violence has been violated. If the child's studies suffer or he or she fears going to school, his or her right to receive an education and to develop to her full potential may also have been violated".

The standing committee released its findings in December 2012, in a report entitled Cyberbullying Hurts: Respect for Rights in the Digital Age. A copy of this report can be found at





The Committee's seven chapter report closely examines the issues and complexities of cyberbullying and its harmful effects on young people, and presents six recommendations that promote societal or whole community approach to understanding and responding to the complexities associated with cyberbullying. This coordinated and collaborative approach engages young people, parents, schools, and governments.

The committee also developed guides for youth and for parents. The informative guide for parents, guardians, and caregivers, summarizes some of the key tenets of the report. It suggests how you can help your child understand and deal with cyberbullying, and how you can work with the school and the community to encourage positive relationships and promote inclusive climates and cultures. The guide for youth encourages youth to make a difference by becoming a model for positive behavior online and promote "digital citizenship". It stresses to youth how they can make a positive impact on their school climates

Supporting Transgender & Transexual Students in Schools

The Nova Scotia Human Rights Act (the Act) has recently adopted legal reforms that specifically incorporate the protection of transgendered persons from discrimination. Under the Act, it is illegal to discriminate with respect to gender identity and expression. It is required by law that transgendered persons be treated with dignity and respect.

The many policies and guidelines that inform the work of the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development speak to the advancement of equity, human rights, and fundamental freedoms as central to the full development of the person. So too, our Education Act states that "students should have a right and a responsibility to participate fully in learning opportunities, contribute to an orderly and safe learning environment and, in appropriate circumstances, participate in decisions that affect their schools".

Based on these new amendments, the Student Services Division (in collaboration with the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission, the Nova Scotia Teachers Union and other partners inside and outside government) is beginning work around developing guidelines for supporting transgender and transsexual students in schools

Beyond merely following mandated human rights legislation by avoiding overt discrimination, schools have an important role to play in fostering environments that allow transgendered students and staff to feel included and safe in their schools. Our schools should provide opportunities for continuous learning related to better supporting the diversity, both appropriately and respectfully, of all those who work, learn, and teach there.

The Student Services Division, along with African Canadian Services Division and the Mi'kmag Liaison Office, is working tirelessly to facilitate Cultural Proficiency Training throughout all eight (8) schools boards in the province. Cultural Proficiency is an inside-out transformational approach to change for educators. This reflective process allows participants to examine critical issues, including transphobia, from across the diversity spectrum. The development of these new guidelines will help to continue support this crucial work which helps build school environments free of discrimination.

APSEA Autism in Education

APSEA Autism in Education Professional Development Opportunity, April 10-11, 2013

The APSEA Autism in Education Project is overseen by an APSEA project director, Sheila Bulmer with a working committee composed of provincial ASD consultants. The mandate of the project is to disseminate the latest research in evidence-based practice for Autism Spectrum Disorder and to provide professional development opportunities to support school based services for student with ASD.

A two day conference was held April 10-11th, on site at APSEA, entitled Translating Research into Practice: Applying Evidence-Based Practices to Address Challenging Behavior in School. Over 50 Autism Specialists/Consultants and ASD Lead Team members from the four Atlantic Provinces met to discuss common issues in service delivery to students with ASD and to hear Dr. Cathy Pratt, Director of the Indiana Resource Center for Autism at the Indiana Institute on Disability, speak on managing behavioural challenges in an educational setting.

This professional development opportunity was a highly anticipated event as it was the first time that ASD specialists from all four Atlantic provinces have come

together to share their experiences and practice in supporting students with ASD. The first day of the conference included presentations from each of the Provincial ASD Consultants followed by roundtable discussion which addressed topics in Sensory Issues and ASD, Vocational and Life skill Programming and Functional Behavioural Assessment in School Settings. The feedback for this networking opportunity was excellent.

Dr. Pratt is a well-recognized leader in the field of Autism. She was a lively and engaging presenter and the audience appreciated her examples from school experience. She provided a very accessible framework for Functional Behaviour Assessment to address challenging behaviour and her emphasis on positive effective behavioural support was very much in keeping with practice current in the Atlantic Provinces. Her straightforward approach to intervention and data collection was appreciated by the group.

The APSEA in Autism in Education working committee is looking ahead to developing additional learning opportunities activities through webinars, website open forum discussion and an annual conference.

Safe Schools

Since January 2013 youth from the J.L.Ilsley Family of schools, in partnership with Dartmouth High and Duncan MacMillan High, have been actively involved in the HRSB Safe Schools Anti Bullying Initiative, discussing issues, researching facts, shooting photos and designing a poster campaign with participating schools.

Youth on the Radar

ArtsExpress has received renewed funding through a Lighthouses Grant from the Department of Justice for the Crime Prevention program "Youth on the Radar," which has been operating in Spryfield since 2009. In partnership with the court system we will be working on a new project called 'Bloodlines', an examination of personal and social origins, family connections and cultural roots through art.

United Way



ArtsExpress has been selected by United Way Halifax to receive multi-year funding in order to establish an artist-in-residence program for the J.L.Ilsley Community Art Space. The program we hope to establish emphasizes in-depth involvement in the arts and focuses on the creative process of art making. Professional artists will work intensively with a core group of youth, with staff and members of the community, acting as mentors, facilitators,

and technical advisers on important artistic concepts and skills. Their presence in the community will be a catalyst for learning and foster a greater awareness of the role of artists and the arts in our society. The program will be coordinated by ArtsExpress in collaboration with the AGNS, NSCAD'S Extended Studies, Dance Nova Scotia and Theatre Nova Scotia.

Artist Miro Davis was the successful candidate for the first year of this residency and will be working in close collaborations with schools, local community and local artisans




Atlantic Canada Social Studies 5: Provincial Identity

The lead teams participated in a series of hands-on workshops which included Geography Skills and Technology, Print —making and Ancient Societies, Learning with Objects—Primary Source Artefacts and Nova Scotia History, Introducing Historical and Inquiry Methodologies into Elementary Social Studies, and an Introduction to the Social Studies 5 Moodle. Participants also had the opportunity to hear a special presentation from Mike Isaac,. Mike is the Student Services Consultant for the Mi'kmaq Liaison Office and an author of two children's books, *How the Cougar Came to Be Called The Ghost Cat* and *The Lost Teachings*.



Thirteen Atlantic universities sent admissions personnel to explain their respective IB recognition policies to the conference attendees. Students also participated in a number of workshops demonstrating various features of the IB.

Heather Michael, IB Coordinator and Theory of Knowledge teacher at C.P. Allen High School, has been chosen to attend the IB Conference of the Americas in New Orleans in July as a guest of the IB Organization.

Ms. Michael has collaborated with Dr. Jennifer Mitton, Faculty of Education Professor at St. Francis Xavier University, on a program called Project Worldview. The project involves all grade 11 IB students at C.P. Allen in eight 75-minute sessions over a period of eight months. The sessions ask students to inquire deeply into their understanding of international issues

within the core framework of the Theory of Knowledge, Extended Essay, and Creativity/Action/Service requirements. Both Dr. Mitton and Ms. Michael have been invited to present this exciting interdisciplinary program to delegates at the 2013 International Baccalaureate Conference.

The sessions were provided to staff from the District Health Authorities, school boards, community services and Justice. Participants discussed how we can provide better, more coordinated services to children, youth and families, when the different service providers share information about a youth. The workshops covered information on how agencies can share necessary information in compliance with all relevant legislation and policies, the SchoolsPlus consent form, the Information Sharing Guidelines and group case studies.

There will be upcoming professional development on May 10th for the SchoolsPlus facilitators and community outreach workers. The morning will be on Trauma Informed Services followed by amendments to Bill 102 and its impact on support staff. This will also provide an opportunity to network and share the various programs the SchoolsPlus sites offer in their schools. It will be an informative and participatory session. Participants will learn how to create trauma informed environments. Topics covered will

include: understanding trauma, process and effects of trauma, what are trauma informed services, modulation, co-regulation and self-care. Trauma Informed Services are about what we as staff do, the focus is on what how we support students and their families who have experienced trauma. Teachers will learn how to teach using design challenges, how to write design challenges, and how to connect outcomes to student achievement.

SAFETY EQUIPMENT

GRADES 9–12

All schools offering grades 9 through 12 production technology that currently use a table saw will soon receive the safest saw available.The SawStop table saw is designed to stop the blade within five one thousandths of a second upon contact with human flesh.

In addition, each school outfitted with a production technology laboratory will be receiving a "lock-out, tag-out" electrical safety kit as part of the dust collection remediation program. This kit will allow teachers to lock out a machine when it is out of order or undergoing repairs using the latest standard in safety equipment.
